SUBJECT:

Proposal to transfer Napa County from Northwest to North Bay Region

BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE:

Due to the geographic proximity of Napa to Marin and Sonoma counties, there is a natural alignment of shared issues and concerns. Additionally, the proximity lends itself to ease of communication and participation between and among the three counties.

The resulting change in Greens per Regional Representation will not be significant enough to create disproportional representation statewide or in the Regions concerned.

Current distribution (Napa w/ Northwest Region):

Northwest Region (w/ Napa Co.) = 9,712  
North Bay Region (w/o Napa Co) = 11,443

After transfer (Napa w/ North Bay Region):

Northwest Region (w/o Napa Co) = 8,892  
North Bay Region (w/ Napa Co) = 12,263

The two Regions involved have been notified of the proposed transfer, and no concerns have been raised thus far.

PROPOSAL:

It is hereby proposed that Napa County be transferred from the Emerald Region and merged with the North Bay Region of the Green Party of CA.

TIME LINE:

The proposed change would take effect following approval of the Green Party of CA at its January 2003 Plenary.

SUBJECT:

National Platform submissions approval.

BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE:

This is a proposal to authorize the state platform committee to approve submissions to the national platform committee (PlatCom).

The National Platform is being revised. A new version will be approved at the 2004 convention. All submissions must go through a state. Our plenary could not approve all submissions. It would be too much work for the limited time available at our plenary meetings. However, our Platform Committee could.

PROPOSAL:

To authorize the state platform committee to approve submissions to the national platform committee in its revision process. The first deadline for initial submissions is about April, 2003. All submissions must go through a state.

Several states are too big to have plenaries approving all submissions. It would be too much work for the limited time available at state plenary meetings. However, some state group is required to approve them. Our Platform Committee could be that group and any California Green could submit proposals to them. Submissions must be brief and indicate what section of the platform is being addressed. Approved submission must then be submitted to the national PlatCom on its website in the requested format.

Our state Platform Committee would make submissions available to any California Green that requests them and take their comments.

TIME LINE:

The first deadline for initial submissions is about April, 2003. We must begin that approval process starting in January.

RESOURCES:

The Platform Committee would do this via email. Work hours for committee members would be depend on the number of submissions. No other resources are required.

SUBJECT:

Revise policy in order to allow delegates representing California to the National Party to seek appointment and election to additional terms.

BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE:

In a proposal passed at the San Diego 2000 plenary, we agreed that national delegates representing California to ASGP would serve two consecutive terms then take a year off. Since 2001, the GPCA has become affiliated with GPUS, and we feel this policy needs to be revised and updated to fit in better with the needs of GPCA and GPUS.

The existing policy inhibits our ability to allow delegates that GPCA has affirmed, will find it very difficult, if not impossible to run against delegates from other states who are not under the constraint of GPCA term limits. Many of the committees within GPUS require experience that can only be gained by participation. California is a significant force in GPUS, and we are depended upon to bring focus and drive for the party.

The Steering Committee, and other working groups such as Platform and the Presidential Election Committee would be at the risk of having no leadership from California, as GPCA delegate-candidates would be continual unknowns in national party races.

PROPOSAL:

Remove the current restriction of term limits, and allow delegates to serve consecutive terms as appointed by the Coordinating Committee, and affirmed by the General Assembly. This decision will be revisited every two years.

TIME LINE: To be implemented immediately at the 2002 Santa Clara Plenary. Decision to be revisited every two years.

## ***Coordinating Committee Presentation of GPCA Goals***

On December 7-8, 2002, the Coordinating Committee (CC) of the Green Party of California came out to chilly Pleasant Hill to bask in the mist, celebrate 2002 (our first year running a full slate!) and plan to make even more history in 2003.

There are no state elections in the coming year. It's an ideal time for us Greens to build ourselves into a strong second party for the 2004 elections.

The CC drafted a “Top 10 List” of statewide priorities for the coming year. On January 11, 2003, the CC will bring this list before the General Assembly at the Santa Clara County Plenary for review and discussion, and adoption of the final list.

Keen observers will note that there are more than 10 items in this “Top 10 List.” There were several tie votes.

- Become THE partisan voice to oppose war-mongering.
- Double the number of registered Greens in California (to 300,000).
- Form a permanent Goals & Strategies Committee.
- Double our annual fund raising to \$300,000 by 2004 and increase to \$500,000 by 2005.
- Set up a physical office with 1-2 full-time staffers.
- Statewide adoption of Instant Runoff Voting (IRV).
- Get 200 Greens elected to non-partisan local offices.
- Regular state-to-local training sessions to improve our party skill base.
- Run 2-5 strong, strategic Assembly races.
- A Campus Greens club on every California campus.
- Establish a state Green lobbying group.
- Increase our minority (ethnic, religious, gender/sexuality and age-group) participation by 100%.

County and local chapters may, of course, have local priorities to add to their own lists.

We cannot build this party without everyone's ideas.

Exit Sand Hill Road east toward Stanford. Continue east, turning right at the traffic light on Santa Cruz Avenue. Make an immediate left onto Junipero Serra Boulevard. 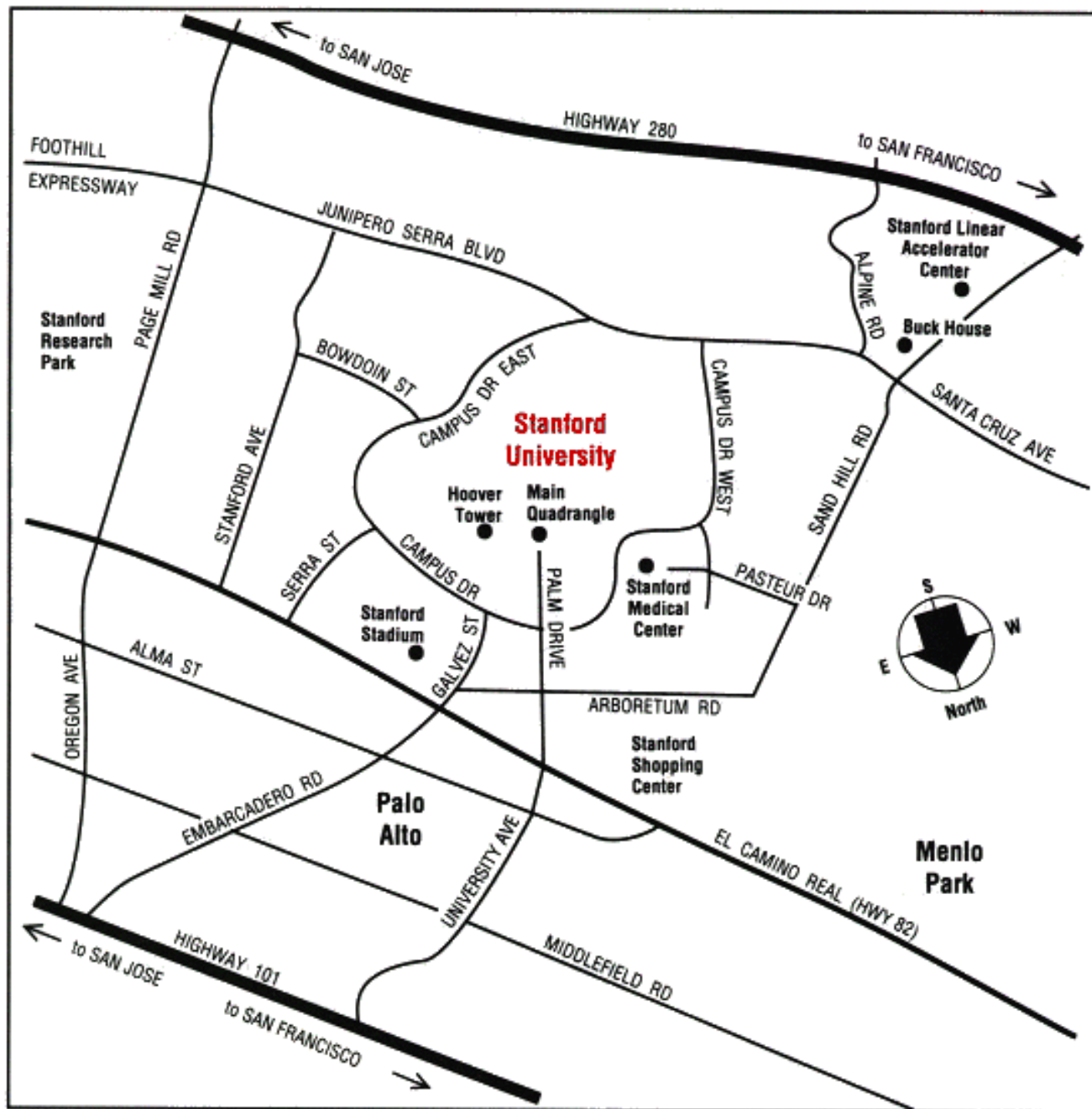

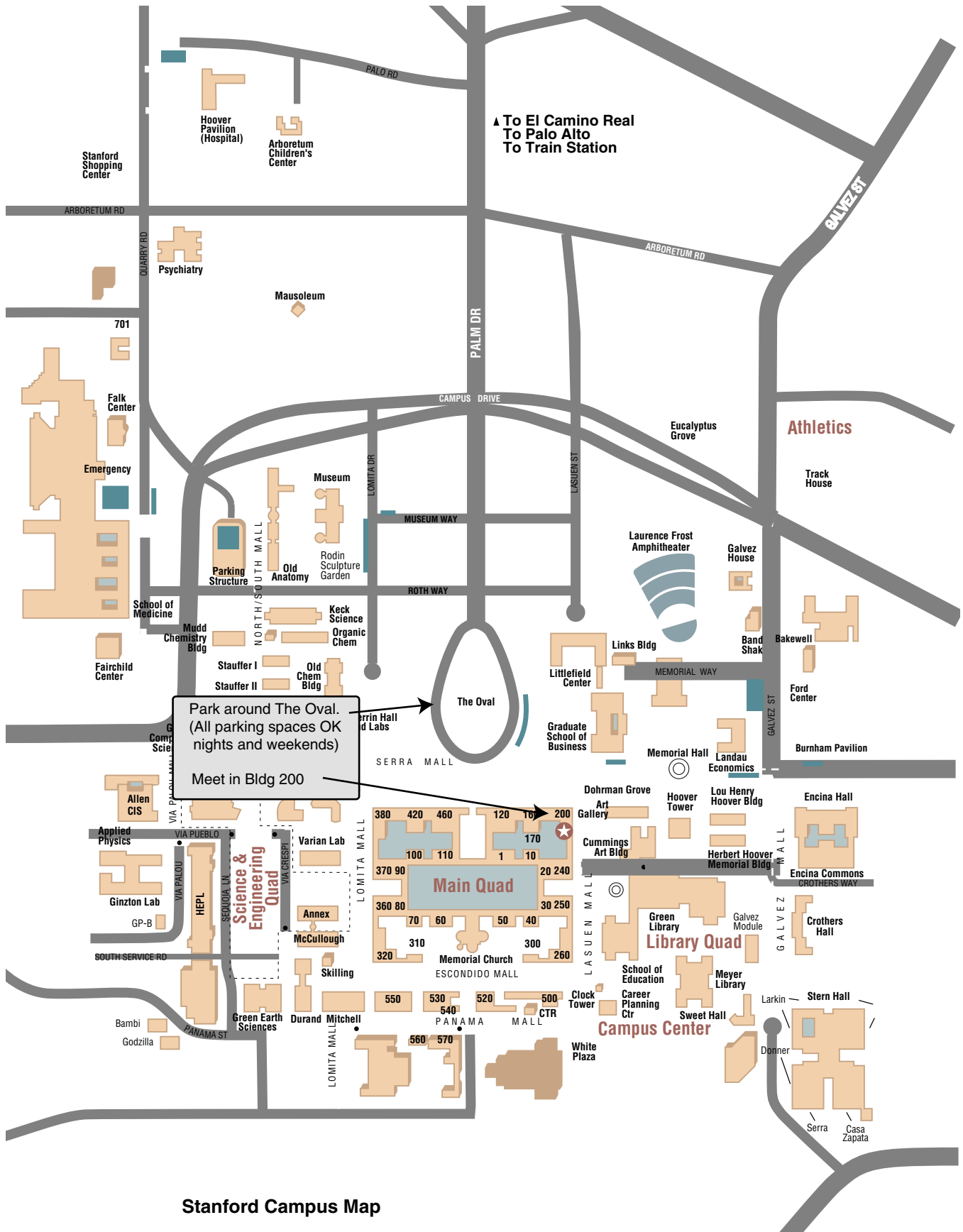
